

CODE RED for Humanity– Address Military Emissions Reporting Women’s International League for Peace and Freedom, U.S.



To John Kerry, US Special Presidential Envoy on Climate,
and the US Delegation

The U.S. Department of Defense is the world’s largest GHG emitter with emissions greater than 120 individual countries. **WILPF U.S. says enough!** Due to US pressure, in 1997 the Kyoto Protocol exempted military emissions from mandatory reporting, but the Paris Agreement made military emissions reporting voluntary in 2015. If we are to meet the goals of the Paris Agreement, ALL emissions must be reported to the UNFCCC annually.

WILPF US calls for:

- The US to lead by example to keep warming below 1.5° C/ 2.7° F of pre-industrial levels.
 - COP 27 set strict GHG emissions limits with no exceptions for the military, include transparent reporting requirements, independent verification, and reject schemes to “offset” emissions. GHG emissions from US overseas bases must be fully reported and charged to the US, not to the country where the base is located.
 - The UNFCCC to require MANDATORY military emissions reporting of all militarized nations and that they revise reporting protocols to be FULLY TRANSPARENT & BASED ON THE GHG PROTOCOL.
 - ALL emissions impact the most vulnerable countries, peoples, and communities causing catastrophic climate change, extreme heat, drought, violent storms, and extreme climate events.
- The US must reduce its military budget to fund loss and damage and Green Fund obligations.

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Loss and Damage - WILPF US requests John Kerry, U.S. Special Presidential Envoy for Climate, to join with world leaders, diplomats, and delegates to create a comprehensive formal Loss and Damage agreement on a financial facility to deliver technical assistance and manage payments to low-income countries struggling through catastrophic disasters.

Countries and their people suffering the most from catastrophic climate events, extreme heat waves, drought, floods & food insecurity have contributed close to nothing in carbon emissions. Current research allows scientists to analyze a flood, storm, or heat wave to produce statistical estimates of the intensification caused by greenhouse gas pollution & associated climate impacts.

Pakistan is the leader of the G77+China, a group now including more than 130 countries that support discussion and action now at this COP 27 on “loss and damage.” For example, costs to Pakistan have tripled to \$30 billion since the end of August with 33 million people affected by the immense flooding, at least 2 million homes & 25,000 schools wrecked or damages, destroyed infrastructure, looming food crises, and ruined cropland, loss of livelihoods and nearly 2,000 dead.

The Green Climate Fund - WILPF U.S. requests John Kerry, US Special Presidential Envoy for Climate, to urgently work with world leaders, diplomats, and delegates to address the need of developing countries for sufficient public financing for mitigation and adaptation.

Low-income countries need hundreds of billions of dollars to annually adapt to climate warming and impacts caused by the richest nations. In 2015, US and other Annex 1 countries pledged to raise an insufficient \$100 billion a year by 2020 but have still not delivered. Climate finance is too often made up of loans rather than grants and not additional to existing aid, further increasing the debt burden of many countries. At COP27, the richest nations must commit to transparent, grant-based finance, targeted at communities that need it most. They must also significantly increase their climate finance commitments to repay the climate debt they owe to those on the frontlines of the climate crisis.

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
