Transportation

Live Oak Friends Meeting is about six miles from the Hilton Post Oak Hotel which is where the US Campaign for Palestinian Rights will host its conference from October 27-29. Sign up for that conference here.

Ride sharing or taxi will be the fastest way to travel. The price for a one-way ride share (Uber, Lyft) might be as low as \$9 and takes 10-16 minutes.

Houston has public transportation, but to get between the hotel and our venue you will have to ride two or three buses with about an hour of travel time each way. One-way fare is \$1.25, with free transfers for up to three hours in one direction. You can pay with exact cash or a mobile app. See https://www.ridemetro.org/. All buses are ADA compliant (wheelchair accessible).

Meals

Childcare

Houston Area Attractions

Harris County is one of the most diverse counties in the nation. You can find just about any kind of cuisine in the Greater Houston Area. Our meeting venue and the hotel for the US Campaign for Palestinian Rights conference are several miles west of downtown Houston. Memorial Park is one of the larger parks that is centrally located. Discovery Green is a park in the downtown area. The Museum District with multiple great places to visit is about eight miles from the meeting venue. Within that district is extensive green space. Many other museums are located in other areas. The Houston Galleria is nearby. The NASA Visitor Center is about an hour to the southeast.
