# CALL FOR PEACE: MOVE THE MONEY ACTIONS TO TAKE TODAY

## Please take these actions today:

## First, call your representative to ask that he or she join the new <u>House</u> <u>Defense Spending Reduction Caucus</u>.

#### Remember: After the November election you may have a new representative.

#### If a Democrat, first check whether your representative was:

- A. among the 27 Democrats who signed the May 19, 2020 letter (scroll down to see that letter) that Reps. Mark Pocan (D-WI) and Barbara Lee (D-CA) sent to the Chair of the House Armed Services Committee requesting a reduction in defense spending during the coronavirus pandemic.
- B. among the 93 House of Representatives Democrats (scroll down further to see document titled "Did Your Member of Congress Vote to Cut the Pentagon Budget?") who voted on July 21, 2020 for the amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to 10% cut of \$74 billion from the bloated \$740 billion Pentagon budget.
- C. Then find their Washington office number here.

<u>Here's a short script:</u> Say you are a constituent living in (place name) and calling to ask Rep. \_\_\_\_\_ to join the new House Defense Spending Reduction Caucus. Say you support at least a10% reduction of the 2022 NDAA Pentagon budget and to move money to such human needs as Medicare for All, ending student debt, rebuilding the transportation and drinking water; job retraining for sustainable green energy, and reforestation and many more human needs. <u>Speak up</u> if there is an urgent need in your district.

<u>Note:</u> Please be sure to thank your representative if he or she signed the May 19<sup>th</sup> letter (A above) or voted for the 10% budget cut (B above), and ask that (Rep. name) invite colleagues in the House to join this new caucus. Your representative needs to contact Barbara Lee's office and tell her they wish to join the caucus. Just voting for the 10% amendment last July does not automatically make them a member of the new Defense Spending Reduction Caucus,

If your Representative is a Republican, please make a call; stress that you are a constituent and that you want your tax dollars spent for human and community needs

where you live (place name). State a particular need you care about and/or need to be funded for your community or state. Ask your representative to consider joining this new House Defense Spending Reduction Caucus.

## Second: Please go to the <u>Move the Money to Human Needs Campaign</u> and there please:

- A. Endorse the Campaign as an individual (at the left side of the page) and
- B. Sign and send the Letter to Representatives Lee and Pocan (at the right side of the page) that you are ready to help build up the Defense Spending Reduction Caucus.

In the future, after we hear more from Reps. Pocan and Lee, we will alert you to how WILPF can help support this important new caucus and advocate for defense budget cuts.

Dear Chairman Smith and Ranking Member Thornberry:

We write to request a reduction in defense spending during the coronavirus pandemic.

As you draft this year's National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), we encourage you to authorize a level of spending below last year's authorized level. Congress must remain focused on responding to the coronavirus pandemic and distributing needed aid domestically. In order to do so, appropriators must have access to increased levels of non-defense spending which could be constrained by any increase to defense spending.

In the last three years alone – during a time of relative peace – we have increased annual defense spending by more than \$100 billion, almost 20 percent. This has occurred during a period without any military action authorized by this Congress. Right now, the coronavirus is our greatest adversary. It has killed more than 90,000 Americans, far surpassing the number of casualties during the Vietnam War.<sup>1</sup> We must remain focused on combating the coronavirus and not on increasing military spending that already outpaces the next 10 closest nations combined (China, India, Russia, Saudi Arabia, France, Germany, the United Kingdom, Japan, South Korea, and Brazil).<sup>2</sup> At some point, spending more than every other nation on earth must be enough.

America needs a coronavirus cure, not more war. We need more testing, not more bombs. In order to reopen our nation in a data-driven, safe manner, we need to focus our spending efforts on the millions of additional coronavirus tests and tens of thousands of additional contract tracers we will need, as well as covering treatment costs, developing therapeutics, and distributing future vaccines.

We thank you for your service as Chairman and Ranking Member of the Armed Services Committee and your consideration of this request. These are unparalleled times. We encourage you to constrain defense spending during this pandemic so that we can defeat the greatest threat to our nation – the coronavirus.

# Did Your Member of the House of Representatives Vote to Cut the Pentagon Budget? adapted from Win Without War, August 2020

In July, 2020 — as the U.S. fought a devastating pandemic, economic collapse, rampant unemployment, and a housing crisis — Congress greenlit almost three quarters of a **TRILLION** dollars for the already-out-of-control Pentagon budget. It didn't have to be this way!

Senators Sanders, Markey and Warren and Representatives Pocan, Lee, and Jayapal introduced amendments to the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to cut the Pentagon budget by 10%, and invest those funds instead in critical human needs. When these amendments came to a vote last July, 23 Senators and 93 Representatives voted to cut the budget.

This level of support would have been unthinkable a few years ago – a testament to the power of the peace movement. But we need to do more.

Today, WILPF is focusing on our representatives on this list (Keep in mind that this list is from July 2020, and you may have had a different representative elected in November 2020)
